

Victoria Griswold, ISO Violinist, One of Only Five Orchestra Musicians in the Country to Receive Ford Musician Awards for Excellence in Community Service from League of American Orchestras

Griswold to Share Award-Winning Work at the League's 74th National Conference in Nashville, June 3-5

(May 9, 2019) – The Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra's own Victoria Griswold is one of just five orchestra musicians from across the U.S. who will receive **Ford Musician Awards for Excellence in Community Service** from the League of American Orchestras at the <u>League's 74th National Conference in Nashville, June 3-5, 2019</u>. The awards celebrate professional orchestra musicians who provide exemplary service in their communities and make a significant impact through education and community engagement.

This year's awardees work with children of all ages in a variety of initiatives, introducing young children to orchestral instruments through story, live music, and movement; teaching hearing and speech-impaired children new skills; providing music education and engagement to students from underserved communities; connecting with children and families in outlying communities through creative programming; and facilitating the creation of new compositions by high school students.

"The ISO is so proud and honored to work with Victoria," said CEO James Johnson. "Her creativity and energy are inspiring, and the innovative programs she developed with our Learning Community have opened up an entirely new avenue to introduce families to our mission. Bringing engaging programming into the neighborhoods of our community allows us to circumvent the barriers of accessibility preventing some young people and their families from connecting with us."

"These musicians' artistry and commitment drives compelling work that touches the lives of so many in their communities," said Jesse Rosen, the League's President and CEO. "Ford Motor Company Fund's ongoing support has helped us share the inspiring stories of these trailblazing mentors and leaders with the entire orchestra field and beyond."

The musicians will receive their awards at the League of American Orchestras' <u>Conference Luncheon</u>, June 4 at 12:45 p.m., and discuss their work at <u>Musicians Transforming Communities</u>, an elective session for Conference delegates on June 4 at 9:00 a.m. Videos of the musicians in action will be posted on the League's website after the Conference.

A member of the ISO since 1993, Victoria Griswold began writing programs for the *Teddy Bear Series* in 2014. The *Teddy Bear Series* introduces preschool & kindergarten students (ages 3-7) to the orchestra through story, movement, and live music. Each program features five musicians from the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra performing alongside dramatic narration in a unique, interactive experience. Griswold has created four unique stories so far. In 2018, Griswold adapted

one of her stories, *The Garden Symphony*, into a book, the first children's book published by the ISO. The organization plans to publish another story from the series, *Monkey's Jungle Jam*, in late 2019.

Victoria and the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra received the Indiana Library Federation Collaboration Award for the *Teddy Bear Series* in 2018. This award recognizes a corporation, organization, individual library, or a group of libraries that has made significant contributions in the efforts of promoting library services in a community, region, or at the statewide level.

About the Ford Musician Awards for Excellence in Community Service:

Now in its fourth year, the League's Ford Musician Awards program, made possible by the generous support of Ford Motor Company Fund, honors and celebrates professional orchestra musicians who provide exemplary and meaningful service in their communities and make a significant impact through education and community engagement.

The musicians were selected by a panel of peer professionals through a competitive nomination process to receive the awards, which include a \$2,500 grant to each musician, as well as an additional \$2,500 grant to the musician's home orchestra to support professional development focused on community service and engagement for musicians.
