# A Magical Midwinter Reprieve, ISO's Music of the Earth Festival Begins Jan. 7

Third annual multi-week, multi-venue music festival features R. Strauss' An Alpine Symphony, Mahler's "The Song of the Earth," and two renditions of Vivaldi's The Four Seasons

INDIANAPOLIS —Audiences in need of a midwinter reprieve can immerse themselves in spectacular orchestral performances, breathtaking views of the Alps, yoga, and other spiritual and environmental programs at the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra's Music of the Earth Festival January 7 - 22.

"The Music of the Earth Festival is a natural extension of the Cosmos theme from last season, which was a great thrill for me as a conductor," explained Music Director Krzysztof Urbański. "Now I'm drawing inspiration from those composers who were captivated by our beautiful planet in order to present another landmark moment in music-making with the ISO."

This is the third consecutive year that Maestro Urbański has programmed a midwinter music festival for the ISO. This year's centerpiece events are two weeks of performances at Hilbert Circle Theatre, both conducted by Urbański. The first week's program, beginning Jan. 12, includes Copland's *Appalachian Spring* and Strauss' *An Alpine Symphony*, performed to projected images by noted photographer and musician Tobias Melle. The following weekend, the ISO presents Mahler's epic *Das Lied von der Erde* ("The Song of the Earth") and Hans Richter's remix of Vivaldi's *The Four Seasons*, with violinist Alexi Kenney.

Richter's avant-garde version of *The Four Seasons* was first performed in 2012 and has had critics talking ever since. While he said he discarded 75 percent of Vivaldi's original composition, audiences will recognize many of the familiar melodies in what Richter describes in an interview with *The Guardian* as "throwing molecules of the original into a test tube with a bunch of other things, and waiting for an explosion."

To emphasize the contrast between compositions, seven ISO musicians will perform Vivaldi's original *The Four Seasons* at a free concert at the Sidney and Lois Eskenazi Hospital on Jan. 16.

Several other programs and performances are scheduled to take place around the city as part of the festival. Venues include the Circle City Industrial Complex, Indy Reads Books, The Center for the Performing Arts, and Marian University. Ball State, Purdue, and Indiana universities will also participate.

Music Director Krzysztof Urbański begins the first of the *Music of the Earth Festival* concerts with Copland's *Appalachian Spring*. What follows will be, by far, the biggest piece the ISO will play this season. The hour-long performance of R. Strauss' *An Alpine Symphony* requires approximately 120 musicians on stage. With images by Tobias Melle of the Alps as a backdrop, this epic performance will take audiences on a musical journey representing the emotional highs and strain of an 11-hour mountain adventure from daybreak to nightfall.

The ISO is joined by Grammy Award-winning mezzo-soprano Sasha Cooke, American tenor Paul Groves, and violin soloist Alexi Kenney in a moving performance of Mahler's poignant *Das Lied von der Erde* conducted by Maestro Urbański. Drawn from delicate lines of Chinese poetry, Mahler's serene "The Song of the Earth" is the first of his great farewells: music as life giving, life sustaining, and life loving as the Earth itself. The concert begins with a fresh take on Vivaldi's *The Four Seasons*, as recomposed by Max Richter for violin, harpsichord, and orchestra.
